NYPD's Community Initiatives

- Neighborhood Policing states that the police officers who patrol within the community are the ones who most commonly interact with the community, but the Patrol Services Bureau has tried to get each precinct to interact with their community. By the precinct being involved with their community, such as going to businesses asking about how to improve safety. But also setting up events on how to interact with the community to build better communication
- Police officers are taken out of their regular duty to patrol the community and patrol the neighborhood to respond to concerns and problems of the community. Police officers that are seen in the area are often responding to calls of crimes that have occurred. It is commonly known as the high call of crimes.



Case Studies

- "An underlying principle of the PAL program is to promote strong positive relationships between officers and kids, families and communities," (NYC PAL, 2017). This program works to build relationships in the entire community with local precincts.
- "Programs are open to all kids, and offer a variety" of services to city youths confronted by high risk factors in New York City's most challenging neighborhoods," (NYC PAL, 2017). These programs are offered to high-risk communities that usually experience parental divorce or violence, such gang violence, domestic or anything that sort.

Community affairs also offers programs to the youth in learning about law enforcement such as the Summer Youth Police Academy, Law Enforcement Explorers, and Police Athletic League. NYC PAL. (n.d.)

The Summer Youth Police Academy is one of the several innovative and effective programs that provides for young people in NYC. It is offered to youth between ages 10 to 15.
